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Thanks to a serendipitous encounter on Ellis Island, Elizabeth Bush's grandfather Ted "Papa" Bush was routed to Chicago, beginning her family's lifelong affection for the city by the lake. Water imagery abounds in most of the photographs Elizabeth takes each summer when she visits her family in Delray Beach, Florida.

Dan Campion is the author of A Playbill for Sunset (poems) and the monograph Peter De Vries and Surrealism and a co-editor of the anthology Walt Whitman: The Measure of His Song.
